

## **Newfoundland and** Labrador



Torngat Mountains



From the Inuktitut word Torngait, meaning "place of spirits," the Torngat Mountains have been home to Inuit and their predecessors for thousands of years. This National Park comprises 9,700 km<sup>2</sup> of the Northern Labrador Mountains natural region. Polar bears hunt seals along the coast, and both the Torngat Mountains and George River caribou herds cross paths as they migrate to and from their calving grounds. Today, Inuit continue to use this area for hunting, fishing, and travelling throughout the year.

### Red Bay



Right and bowhead whales, once plentiful in the waters of coastal Labrador, attracted whalers from the Basque region (northern Spain and southern France) during the 16th century. A thriving industry based on the production of whale oil for export to Europe developed along the Labrador coast during the mid to late 1500s. The busiest port for this historic enterprise was the sheltered harbour of Red Bay.

#### 5 Port au Choix



Port au Choix, on the west side of Newfoundland's Great Northern Peninsula, has been populated for thousands of years. The remains of four ancient cultures have been found at Port au Choix to date: Maritime Archaic Indian, Dorset and Groswater Paleoeskimo, and Recent Indians. Archaeologists searched many years for a site such as this one, which sheds new light on our understanding of native peoples in this part of the world.

The reconstructions of three Norse buildings are the focal point of this archaeological site, the earliest known European settlement in the New World. The archaeological remains at the site were declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1978. Exhibits highlight the Viking lifestyle, artifacts, and the archaeological discovery of the site. Visitors can also explore the hiking trails to nearby bays and lakes.

Hawthorne Cottage was the Brigus, Newfoundland home of famous Arctic explorer Captain Bob Bartlett. The cottage is a fine example of the Picturesque style of architecture in Newfoundland and is furnished with artifacts and memorabilia from Captain Bob's voyages.

From the top of Cabot tower, your view of St. John's and the North Atlantic is spectacular. With such strategic advantage, it's no wonder that Signal Hill was the site of harbour defences from the 18<sup>th</sup> century through the Second World War. Centuries before the advent of ship-to-shore radio, signalmen surveyed the ocean for ships headed for St. John's. In 1901, Marconi received the first transatlantic wireless signal here.

The oldest surviving lighthouse in Newfoundland and Labrador is located at the most easterly point of land in North America. It has been restored and shows how a lightkeeper and his family might have lived in the mid-19th century. The site is surrounded by spectacular scenery and wildlife such as whales, seabirds and icebergs in season.

#### **New Brunswick**





Kouchibouguac is a fascinating mosaic of bogs, salt marshes, tidal rivers, sparkling freshwater systems, sheltered lagoons, abandoned fields and tall forests which characterizes the Maritime Plain Natural Region. Natural wonders abound in this Park that boasts 25 kilometres of shifting sand dunes that are home to the endangered piping plover and witness to colonies of both harbour and grey seals that frolic in the sunshine on certain sections of the dunes.

Fundy National Park encompasses some of the last remaining wilderness in southern New Brunswick. Here, the conifer dominated Caledonia Highlands roll down to meet the fog-generating Bay of Fundy. The tidal fluctuation of the Bay of Fundy is the highest in the world. Watch fishing boats come and go to the rhythm of the bay. Inland, explore lush forests and deep stream valleys.

St. Andrews Blockhouse National Historic Site is situated in the picturesque seaside resort of St. Andrews, in southwestern New Brunswick. Here you will step back in time to an era of conflict along New Brunswick's border with the United States. Imagine a time when these neighbours were at war. Fearful of American invasion, townspeople built this blockhouse, to military specifications, during the War of 1812.

Carleton Martello Tower dates from the War of 1812 and played a pivotal role in conflicts up until the Second World War. The site features a restored powder magazine, a restored barracks room, and exhibits in the tower and in the Visitor Centre. Visitors will also marvel at the spectacular view of the city of Saint John and its harbour.


#### **Prince Edward Island**

Kejimkujik is the only National Park that is also a National Historic Site in Canada. Discover a landscape rich with Mi'kmaw cultural heritage including ancient canoe routes, portages, fishing grounds and one of North America's largest collection of aboriginal rock art more commonly known as petroglyphs. Explore Kejimkujik's gentle wilderness; a land of rocky lakes, gently flowing rivers and tranquil forests and discover the largest protected wilderness area in the Maritimes. It'she perfect getaway to explore the UNESCO Southwest Nova Biosphere.

# 25 Cape Breton Highlands



Plan an exhilarating adventure in the hiking capital of Eastern Canada. Twenty-six trails will take you over 150 km of diverse terrain: ocean coastlines, panoramic peaks, the rare taiga forest, and splendid waterfalls. Climb 5000 feet and burn 40,000 calories spotting moose, eagles and whales along the way. Cape Breton's magnificent northern shore and the incredible plateaus on the world-renowned Cabot Trail await you.

Perched on the shore of the Annapolis Basin, Fort Anne is Canada's first national historic site - it was here that Europe's empire builders once vied for supremacy in the 1600s and 1700s. Visit the Officers' Quarters and experience the life a soldier and discover the role the star-shaped fort played in the colonization, settlement and government of Nova Scotia. The fort's impressive heritage tapestry is a visual reminder of the drama and intrigue that shaped the area's storied and historic past.

Port-Royal National Historic Site features a reconstruction of the Habitation, where, in 1605, Samuel de Champlain helped establish one of the earliest European attempts at settlement in North America. Listening to costumed interpreters and joining in period demonstrations, you understand the challenges faced by the French as they carved out a destiny. Let your imagination soar as you walk the shore of the Annapolis Basin, and gaze at the same horizon Champlain would have seen. As it was for him, it is a new horizon.

#### 28 Grand-Pré



Grand-Pré commemorates the spirit of the Acadian people. The tragic Deportation that took place between 1755 and 1762 will leave you emotionally touched.

As you gaze at the face of the statue that stands here you realize that it symbolizes the collective strength of all Acadians. For Evangeline there is no cold in winter, no warmth in summer, only an eternal longing and perhaps a tear or two as she stands forever anchored to the land she calls home.

In the 17th and 18th centuries, Beaubassin was one of the most populous and most strategic regions in Acadia. The village, under British rule since 1713, was burned by the French in 1750 to force the inhabitants to the Beauséjour side of the river.

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### 29 Fort Lawrence

In 1750, the British erected Fort Lawrence on the former site of the Beaubassin village. They remained there until June 1755, when they crossed the Missaguash River and captured Fort Beauséjour.

# 30 Fort Edward



Authentic and illustrative, Fort Edward is the real deal. Step into another epoch and learn the story of the oldest surviving block house in Canada built in 1750 to secure the overland route between Annapolis Royal and the new capital at Halifax. Stationed high on a hill overlooking a vast river valley once inhabited predominantly by the Mi'kmag and Acadians. Discover how the British soldiers lived and acted and see why this strategic location was pivotal in helping secure a British stronghold in Nova Scotia.




Entering the Halifax Citadel you find yourself transported to the age of Queen Victoria, when Halifax was an important naval base for the British Empire, guarded by the kilted 78th Highlander regiment.

Heft a soldier's knapsack in the restored barracks, stand in awe as the Royal Artillery command the firing of the noon gun, and lend a hand to a soldier's wife with her daily chores. Lift your spirits with the sound of the bagpipes and rattle of the drums - it's 1869!

Strolling through Halifax's immensely popular Point Pleasant Park, you discover this grey stone tower, like a miniature medieval castle, standing in the midst of a forest clearing. The first fort of its kind in North America, the Prince of Wales Tower was built by order of Prince Edward, Duke of Kent in 1796-97 to help protect nearby British gun batteries from French attack. Today the tower is part of Halifax's historic defence system including the powerful Halifax Citadel in the city centre.

York Redoubt, overlooking the mouth of Halifax Harbour, played a pivotal role in the defence of Halifax until the Second World War. Taking in the spectacular panoramic view from Lookout Hill or the earthen ramparts, you can easily imagine the reluctance of an enemy fleet to brave the line of massive cannons that still line the grassy walls. Wander the pathways and trails and imagine what the harbor would have looked like in 1793 - the views are stunning.

As you explore Canso Islands National Historic Site, you imagine that it's the early 1700s and you're watching French fishermen bringing their chaloupes into shore. Soon, the small fishing boats will be unloaded - the cod salted, dried and shipped to Europe, America and the Caribbean. The screeching of the gulls is an appropriate soundscape for a place that provides such dramatic saltwater memories.



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
