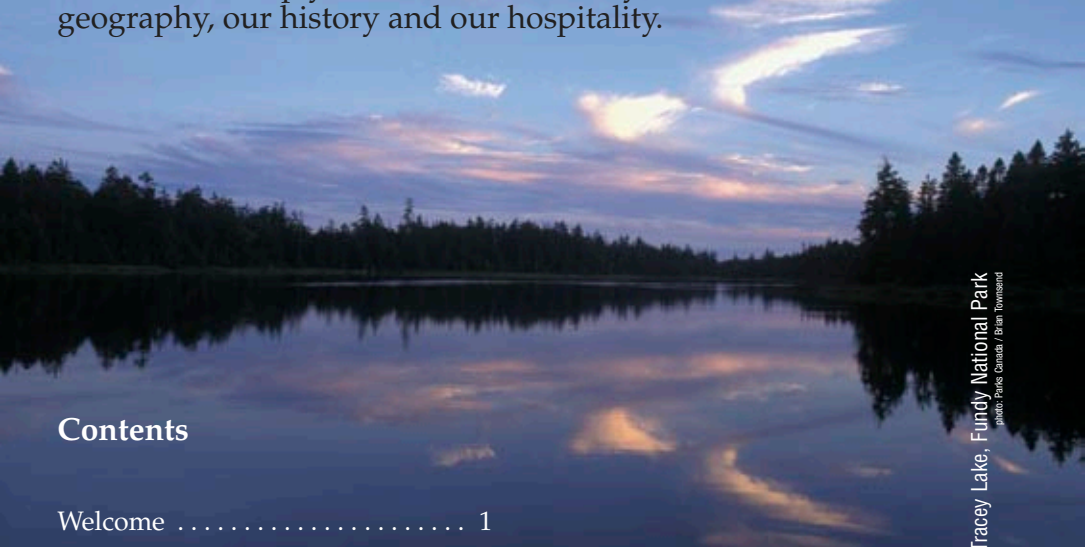

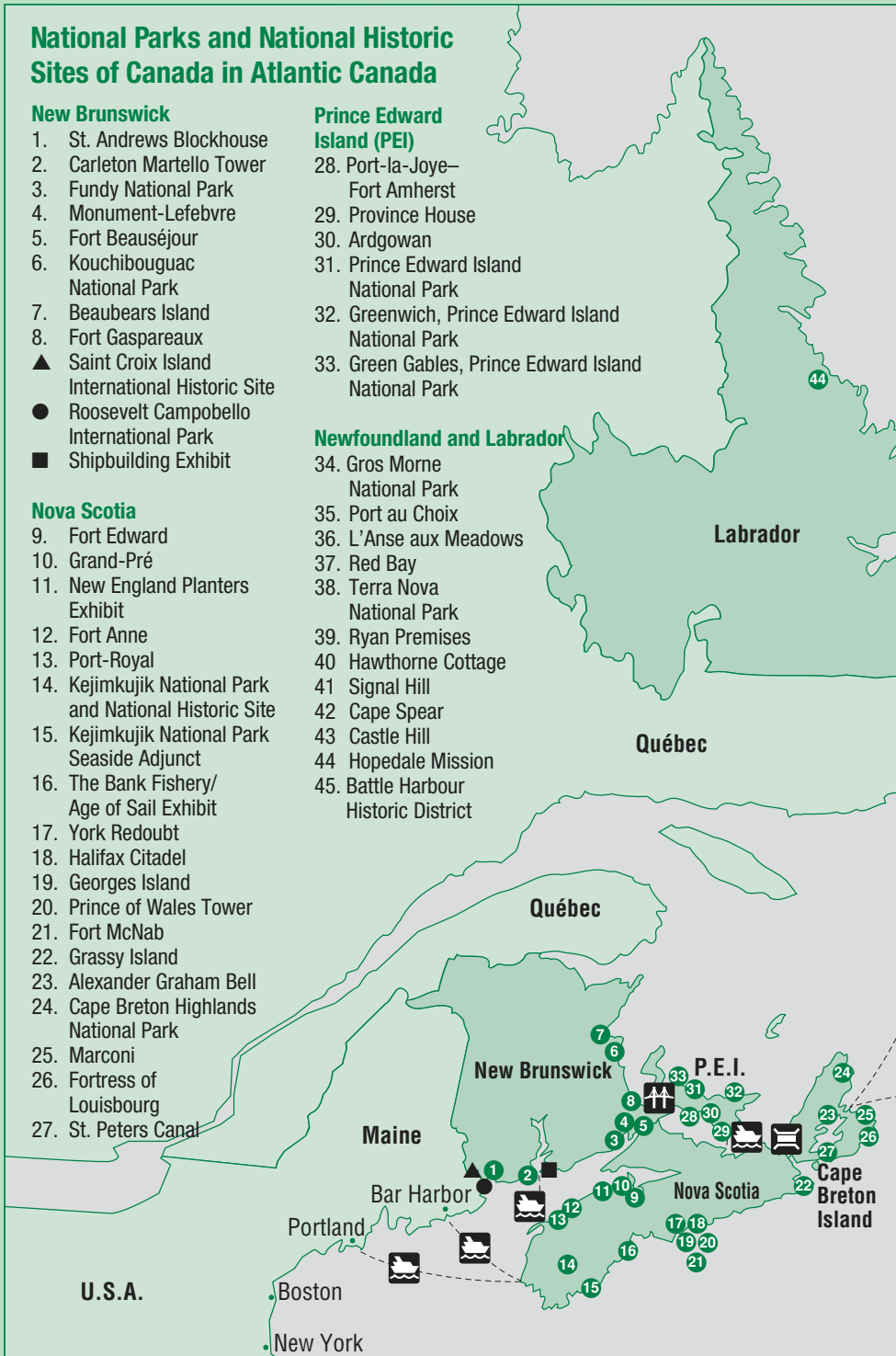

ST ANDREWS BLOCKHOUSE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE OF CANADA

Fearful of American invasion, townspeople built this blockhouse for border defence during the War of 1812. St. Andrews Blockhouse kept its strategic value until the 1840s and today contains elements of the oldest blockhouse in New Brunswick.

Making the Most of Your Visit

- Plan to spend 30 minutes at the Site.
- Ask staff about life in the blockhouse and view the exhibits.
- Have a picnic in nearby Centennial Park.
- Enjoy the waterfront of St. Andrews and view the St. Croix, a heritage river.

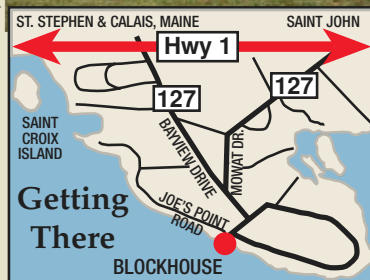

CARLETON MARTELLO TOWER NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE OF CANADA



Built for the war of 1812, this circular stone fort served a crucial role in the defence of Saint John and its harbour until 1944. The Tower's unique architecture spans 130 years of coastal defence technology.

Making the Most of Your Visit

- Plan to spend at least one hour at the Site.
- Ask interpreters about life in the stone fort.
- View the audio-visual presentation and learn about the defence of Saint John during World War II.
- Explore the barracks and the restored powder magazine.
- Climb to the top of the Tower and admire the spectacular view of Saint John

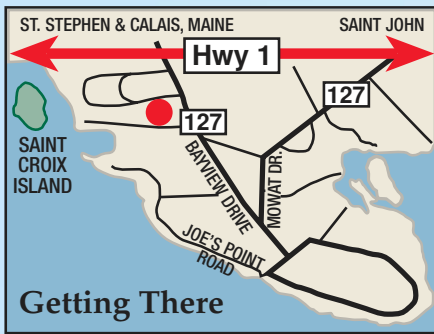
SAINT CROIX ISLAND INTERNATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

2004 marks the **400th anniversary** of the first attempt at permanent French settlement in North America.

In 1604, French soldier-courtier Pierre Dugua Sieur de Mons arrived in Acadie on the flagship *Bonne-Renommée*. The ship's company included Samuel de Champlain, a skilled mapmaker and chronicler. De Mons chose Île Sainte-Croix for settlement, an event which symbolizes the founding of Acadie.

The island's isolation and an unusually harsh winter severely tested the colonists. Almost half succumbed to scurvy. De Mons resolved to relocate his colony to a more favourable location across the Bay of Fundy at Port-Royal.

Located at Bayside, near St. Andrews, this site overlooks Saint Croix Island.



Making the Most of Your Visit

- Plan to spend at least 20 minutes at the Site.
- Walk along the footpath to view the interpretive panels.
- This unstaffed site provides a splendid view of the island.
- Picnic tables, gazebo and restrooms are provided.

ROOSEVELT CAMPOBELLO INTERNATIONAL PARK

Enjoy the magic and history of that part of Canada President Franklin D. Roosevelt called his "Beloved Island." His summer home is preserved as a memorial and as a symbol of the close friendship between Canada and the United States.



Making the Most of Your Visit

- Plan to spend an hour touring the Visitor Centre, Roosevelt Cottage, and flower gardens.
- Explore trails, beaches, bogs, forest, and spectacular ocean headlands in the 1,134-hectare (2800-acre) natural area.
- Enjoy a picnic with an ocean or lighthouse view.
- Admission is free.

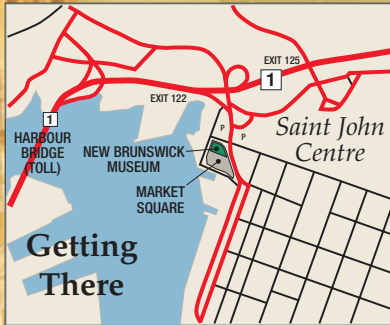

WIND, WOOD AND SAIL EXHIBIT

This exhibit commemorates the national significance of the 19th century shipbuilding industry in New Brunswick. The huge timber industry in the Maritimes was the principal factor behind the development of a very successful sailing-ship industry in Saint John, and throughout the Maritimes, between the 1820s and the early 1890s. In the second half of the 19th century, Saint John became the fourth-largest port of registration of wooden sailing vessels in the world.



Making the Most of Your Visit

- Allow one hour for your visit.
- Watch the 16-minute film.
- Listen to excerpts from the journal of eleven year-old Amelia Holder, daughter of a New Brunswick sea captain.
- Test your skills as a sailor on board a New Brunswick ship by tying knots, bends and hitches.
- The Museum offers many more galleries to help you discover the rich heritage of New Brunswick.

BEAUBEARS ISLAND NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE OF CANADA

The Mi'kmaq used this island as a camp site for many centuries. Following the deportation of the Acadians in 1755, Charles des Champs de Boishébert brought hundreds of refugees to settle on this island. English settlement soon followed. Shipbuilding became a main activity.

Making the Most of Your Visit

- Plan to spend at least one hour exploring the island.
- Imagine a time when the white pines on the island blanketed the Miramichi.
- Experience the island's natural beauty while walking along the central trail.
- Enjoy a picnic amid the tranquil pine forest.

FORT BEAUSÉJOUR NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE OF CANADA

Built in 1751 by the French, Fort Beauséjour was taken in 1755 by the British in a battle for control of Nova Scotia. The fort saw combat again during the American Revolution when it was attacked by rebel sympathizers. It later defended the area during the War of 1812.

Making the Most of Your Visit

- Ask interpreters about the Tantramar salt marshes and their dyke systems.
- Explore the stone ruins and grassy ramparts of this star-shaped fort.
- View the interpretive paintings and imagine life in the garrison.
- View the artifacts, indoor exhibits and visit the gift shop.
- Plan to spend one hour at the Site.

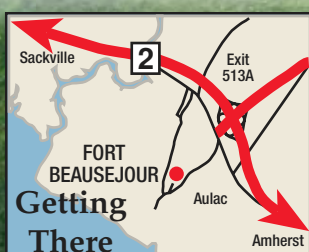
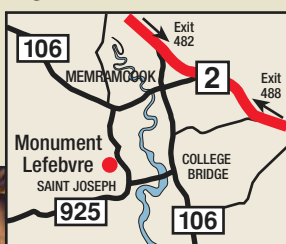

MONUMENT LEFEBVRE NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE OF CANADA

Reflections of a Journey—The Odyssey of the Acadian People, contains exhibits which take you on an Acadian Journey from the time of the Deportation to the present day. Located in the historic Monument-Lefebvre building which hosts a full range of cultural activities in its restored theatre.

FUNDY NATIONAL PARK OF CANADA

At Fundy National Park of Canada, the giant tides of the bay mark nature's subtle cadence. Take advantage of the Park's natural setting, explore the forests, and discover the creatures of the intertidal zone. Spectacular panoramic views of the Bay of Fundy, coastal cliffs and rolling forested hills are yours at Fundy.

Activities

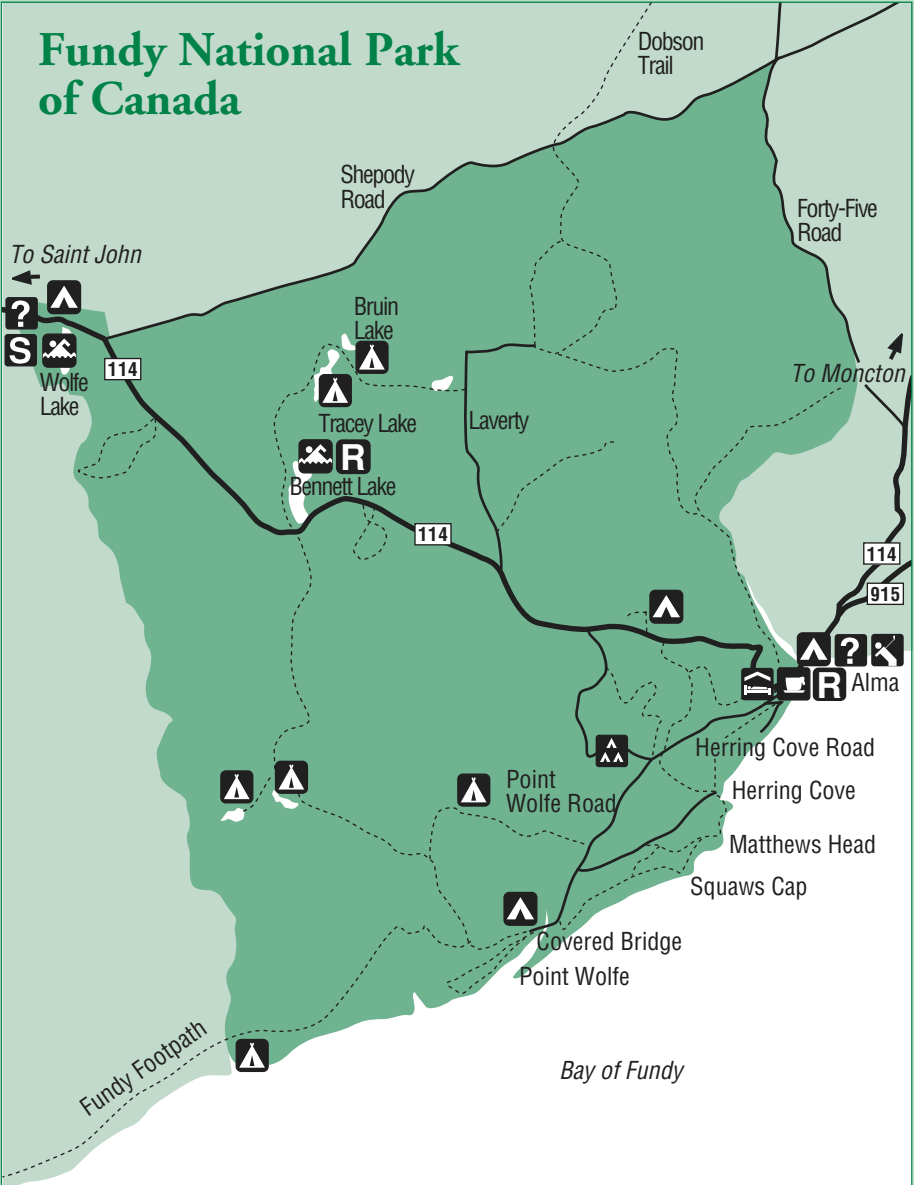
Interpretation programs are offered throughout the summer.

Learn the secrets of the giant tides, sing along at a campfire or discover the park's rich heritage at an evening program. Schedules are posted throughout the park.

Hiking

With 120 km of trails, hiking is one of the most popular activities at Fundy. You can experience cool, mossy valleys and evergreen-scented forests, travel along trails that lace the shores of the majestic Bay of Fundy, or discover one of the Park's many beautiful waterfalls. Trails range from 0.5 km to 10 km and by following 50 km of linked trails, you can even complete the Fundy Circuit.

Camping

Camping is a great way to experience Fundy. The park offers 3 campgrounds. For reservations call 1-800-414-6765.

Chignecto North is a large, wooded campground with serviced and unserviced sites. It features bike trails, wheelchair accessible sites, showers, flush toilets, a dumping station, fireplaces and a playground.

Point Wolfe is a quiet, open campground with beautiful scenery, trails and unserviced sites with fire pits. It features showers and flush toilets.

Headquarters campground is within walking distance of the outdoor theatre, golf course, restaurant, swimming pool and the village of Alma. Showers, flush toilets and a dumping station are available.

Group camping is available at **MicMac** for organized groups wishing to use the Park for educational or recreational purposes. Sites must be reserved in advance; please call (506) 887-6000.

Backcountry Camping sites are on the Goose River, Marven Lake, Tracey Lake and Foster Brook trails. Level tent pads, fireplaces with wood, pit privies, picnic tables and water available.

Backpacking stoves are recommended. Some sites are available year-round.

Accommodations

Fundy Park Chalets is near the golf course and **Fundy Highlands Motel and Chalets** offers views of the Bay. The nearby town of Alma also offers a wide variety of accommodations.

Making the Most of Your Visit

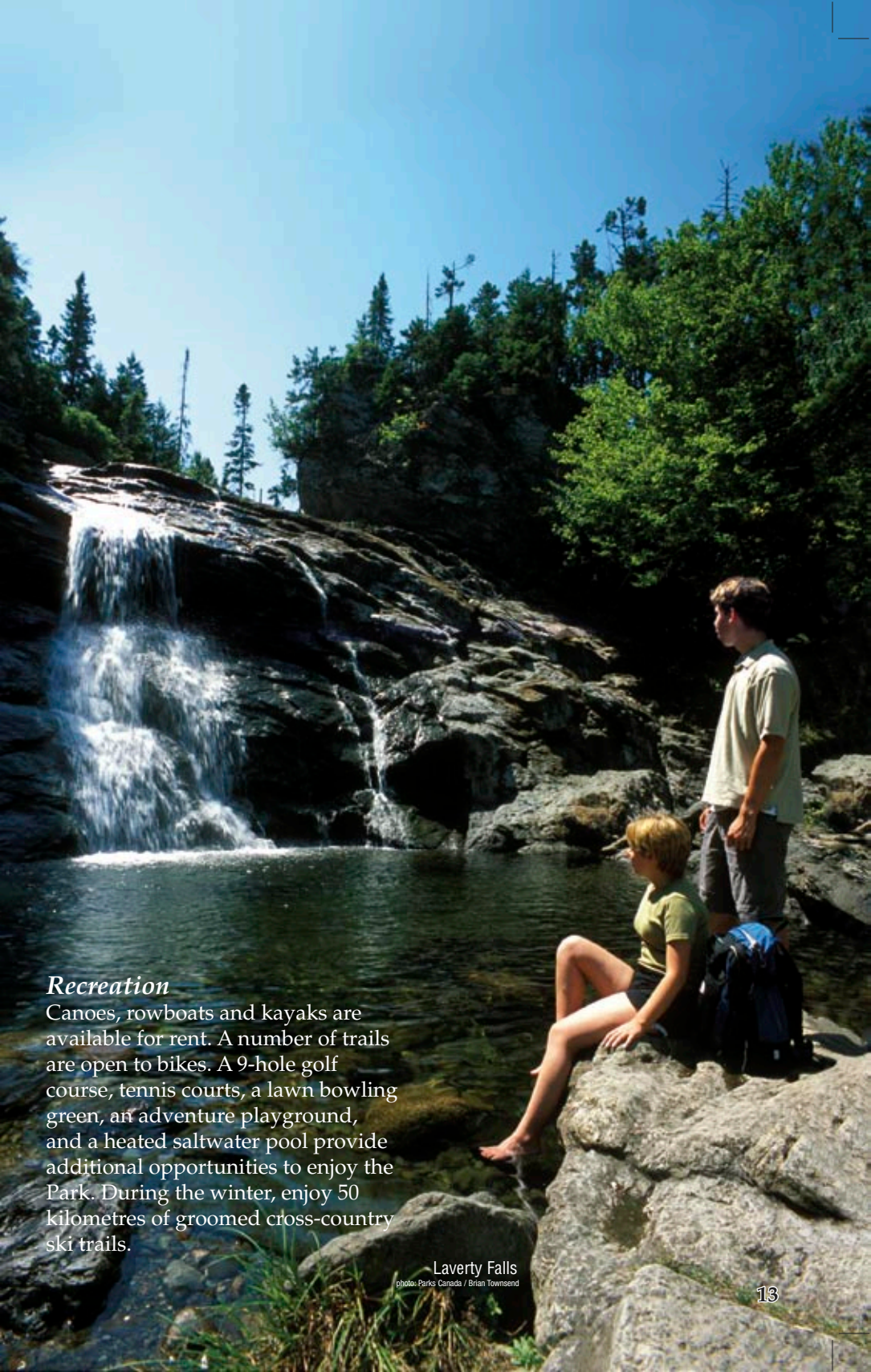
- Allow at least two days for sightseeing and recreation.
- Stop at the Visitor Centre to learn more about things to see and do, and pick up a souvenir at the Visitor Centre gift shop.
- Take a guided tour and explore forest trails and waterfalls.
- Join Park interpreters for a walk on the bottom of the bay at low tide.
- Enjoy an evening presentation at the outdoor theatre.
- View one of the Park's covered bridges—a hallmark of New Brunswick.
- Enjoy the Park by canoe, bike, car, or on foot.
- Autumn colours are especially magnificent.

Recreation

Canoes, rowboats and kayaks are available for rent. A number of trails are open to bikes. A 9-hole golf course, tennis courts, a lawn bowling green, an adventure playground, and a heated saltwater pool provide additional opportunities to enjoy the Park. During the winter, enjoy 50 kilometres of groomed cross-country ski trails.

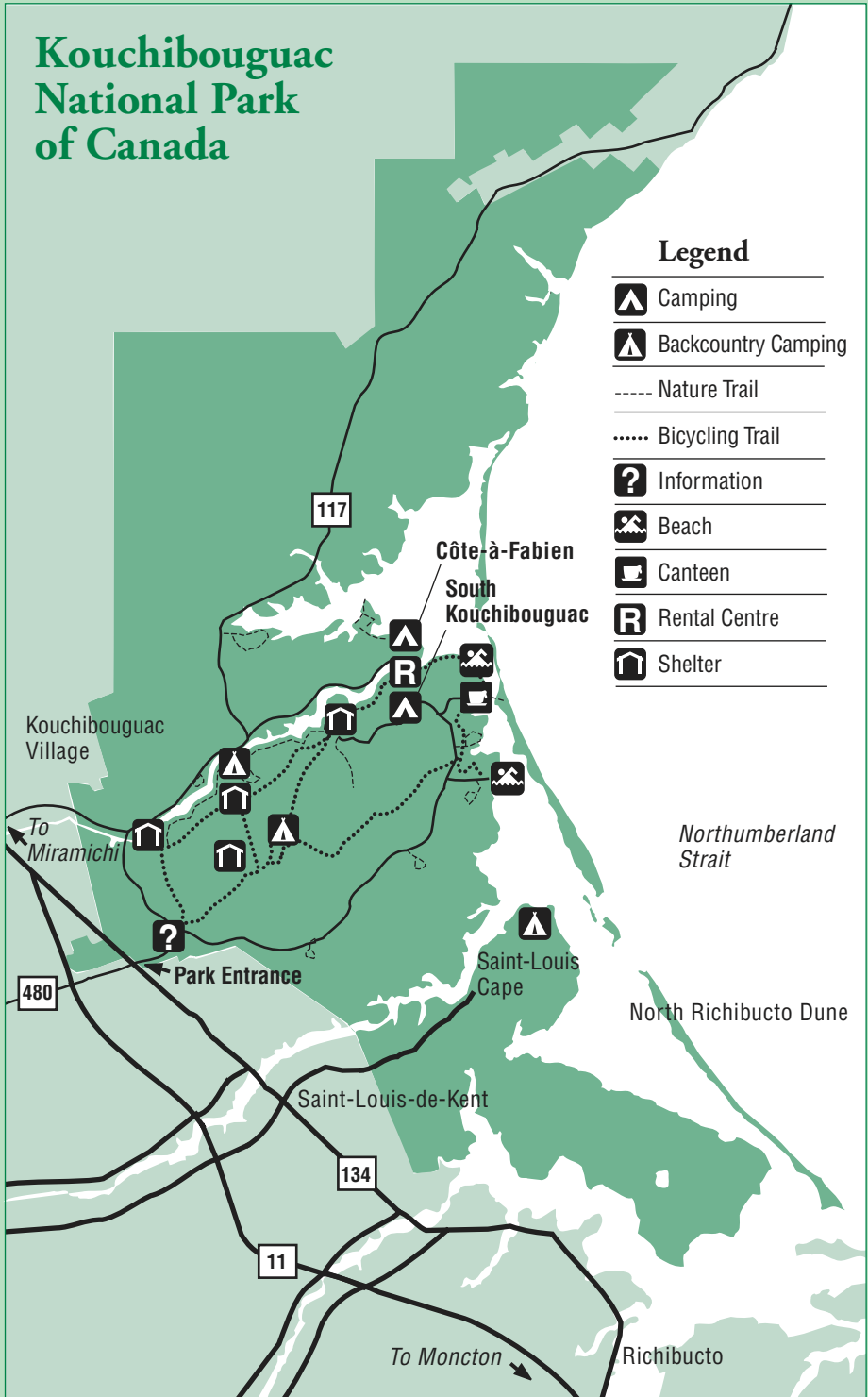

KOUCHIBOUGUAC NATIONAL PARK OF CANADA

Located on New Brunswick's central eastern shore, the Park stretches along the Acadian Coast. Kouchibouguac (pronounced koo-she-boogwack) boasts the warmest salt water north of Virginia. The Park is home to the endangered piping plover, and Tern Island is home to the second-largest tern colony in North America. Pitch your tent and take the family for a day-long adventure. Cycle along fantastic bicycle trails. Walk on endless stretches of beach and watch for grey seals resting on offshore sandbars.

Activities

Interpretation

Interpretation programs are offered throughout the summer. Join an interpreter for a hike, sing along at a campfire or discover the park's heritage at an evening program. Schedules are posted throughout the park.

Biking

Your bike is the perfect way to explore Kouchibouguac. With 60 km of trails it is one of Atlantic Canada's cycling highlights. Trails take you throughout the park and a picnic area is never far away. Bicycles can be rented in the park.

Hiking

You can discover the park on ten nature trails. Explore tidal rivers and lagoons, the Acadian forest, ancient fields, bogs and salt marshes. In winter, hiking trails convert to groomed cross-country ski trails.

On the water

Rent rowboat, canoe, kayak or paddle boat and set out on an outdoor adventure. Explore the parks lagoons and rivers.

Camping

South Kouchibouguac campground offers frontcountry sites with fireplaces, kitchen shelters, picnic tables, playgrounds, washrooms and showers; some electrical hook-ups available. For reservations call (506) 876-1277.

Côte-à-Fabien has 32 unserviced sites; fireplaces, pit privies. Sites are allocated on a "first-come, first-served" basis.

Group Camping

Côte-à-Fabien offers 5 sites for registered, non-profit groups. Reservations required.

Canoe-Camping

Canoe to a wilderness campsite—at both Sipu and Pointe-à-Maxime. (Sipu is also accessible by foot.) Firewood included. Pre-registration required.

Petit-Large Backcountry Sites

Walk or cycle to these sites located in a field surrounded by forest. Registration and backcountry permit required. Eight sites available year-round. Firewood included. Maximum of 5 persons per site.

- Take a guided walk through the forest and along the seacoast.
- Take the family to the puppet show near the beach.
- Enjoy an evening at the campfire circle or take in an outdoor theatre program.
- Visit the gift shop.

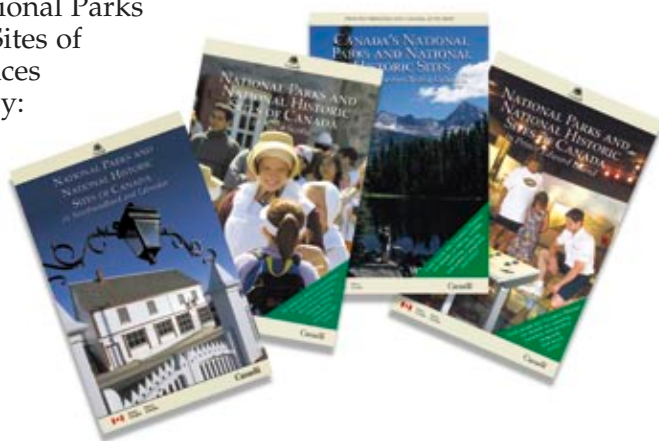
