

Rent a paddle boat and explore Clear Lake as a family.

Hop in your car for a wildlife safari drive in the early evening. What might you see? A White-Tailed Deer, a Black Bear, a Moose or a Bald Eagle?



Day 4


Meander through the rustic and historic town site. Browse through the quaint shops and eat at a local restaurant. The kids will love playing on the swings and slides at the playground.





Saskatoon to Prince Albert National Park via Batoche

ITINERARY & SIGHTSEEING

Day 1

Start Saskatoon to Prince Albert National Park

Distance: 230 km

(add 50 km return to Batoche)

Driving time: 2.5 hours

Start your journey at Batoche National Historic Site with our "Journey Through

Time" tour.

Go back 130 years, meet living characters and have a "blast from

the past."

After your visit, head to the town site of Waskesiu. Book a night in an oTENTik in Beaver Glen Campground. Connecting with nature has never been so easy!

Spend the evening by the campfire or take in our fun program, "Bison Will Rise Again."

Day 2

Waskesiu Lake to West Side of Prince Albert National Park

Distance: 130 km one way

Driving Time: 2 hours

Begin your day at the Waskesiu Visitor Centre. Get directions to the West Side and receive bison safety information.

While there, measure your bison IQ by playing "Match-the-Bison-Horn."

Gather your hiking/biking/camping gear, make a picnic lunch and put gas in your tank. You're off!



Have your binoculars and camera ready for the drive. Will you be lucky enough to see a Sandhill Crane?

Afternoon

Enjoy your picnic overlooking the beautiful Sturgeon River Valley.


After lunch, hike or bike through aspen forest and pockets of open meadow on the 15.5 km Amyot Lake Trail. Look for bison wallows and tracks along the trail. You never know when that magical sighting will happen!

Head home after a spectacular adventure.

Grasslands



At Grasslands National Park, expanses of dinosaur fossils harken back to a time before history. Tipi rings are testament to First Nations communities, and ruins of prairie homesteads tell of settlers intent on taming the prairie.


3 Wapusk



A vast subarctic wilderness of tundra and boreal forest. Wapusk protects one of the world's largest known polar bear maternity denning areas, as well as more than 200 bird species, caribou, wolverine, arctic hare and foxes.

Constructed by skilled local craftsman, the East Gate Registration Complex, with its hand-hewn logs and stone walls built from local materials continues to welcome visitors as a shining example of 1930s architecture.

12 St. Andrew's Rectory



Learn about the significance of the St Andrew's Rectory, an excellent example of mid-19th century Red River Hudson's Bay Company architecture. Imagine the day to day lives of the Reverend and his Red River settler parishioners in the 1800s.

Stone remains of the star-shaped, 18th century Prince of Wales Fort stand on Hudson Bay's tundra shore, offering a glimpse into a remote Hudson's Bay outpost amid a wild subarctic landscape alive with polar bears, birds and beluga whales.

Perched incongruously amid vast tundra wilderness, York Factory was the Hudson's Bay Company's major trading and administration centre for centuries. Its grounds and grand Depot, filled with artifacts, provide profound insights into a pivotal period in Canada's founding days.

The **Wild** Side



Where the **Bison Roam!**

Once hunted to near-extinction. bison are again roaming the prairies. Don't let their large size (up to 2 metres tall at the shoulder) or weight (over 900 kg) fool you. They can run at speeds up to 65 kilometres per hour!



Bugling Elk (Wapiti)

The elk or wapiti is a very vocal member of the deer family. Young elk keep in contact with their mothers with squeals, chirps and mews. Barks warn others of danger. Fall is the best time to hear the elk.



Busy Beaver

Well-known for building dams. canals, and lodges, you can spot these wide-tailed toothy rodents hard at work in streams and ponds. Best time to see this Canadian symbol performing their engineering marvels? Dawn or dusk.



"Little White Whale"

Nicknamed "sea canaries" for their high-pitched underwater vocalizations, some 3,000 Beluga Whales inhabit the warmer waters of the Churchill River after the ice breaks up. Don't be surprised when their curious nature inspires them to investigate...you.



"White Bear"

Polar Bears congregate near Churchill, Manitoba during October and early November. and can be seen as early as June in coastal areas when there is no sea ice present. Adult males average 300 to 450 kg. At birth, cubs are about the size of their mother's paw and weigh less than 1 kg.

Give these animals the space they need. Your responsible behaviour contributes to the survival of wildlife - and your own safety!




