IN ALL THE MOUNTAIN PARKS

Park Information Centres

... where maps, publications and other information are available for the convenience of visitors, are maintained in all these parks.

Entrance Fees

... Entrance to all National Parks is free. Motoring visitors however, are required to obtain a park motor vehicle licence at the entrance. The \$2 licence is good in all National Parks for the entire season. (A licence for Waterton Lakes and prairie parks only is available at \$1.)

Campgrounds and Trailer Areas

... Camping is permitted only in established campgrounds—except by special permit obtained from the nearest Park Warden. Nominal fees are charged for serviced campgrounds where kitchen and washroom facilities are provided.

Other Accommodation

rates chargeable are approved by the National Parks Service. Rate cards are prominently displayed in each room or cabin. Reservations and information concerning accommodation are not handled by Park Information Centres. An Accommodation Directory, however, is available free on request.

Picnic Areas

... are conveniently located adjacent to travelled routes.

Pets

... Dogs and cats may accompany a visitor into a park. For the protection of all park animals, however, dogs must be kept on leash.

Fishing Licences

... at \$2 for the season or \$1 for one month are obtainable from Park Information Centres and Park Wardens.

Warden Service

... Park Wardens patrol all districts in the parks to protect the forests, the wildlife—and all visitors. The Warden Service is assisted by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in maintaining law and order. Warden Stations may be located on all park maps.

Firearms

... are *not* allowed unless sealed. This is done free of charge at park entrances, the Chief Warden's office, or the Warden Station nearest your point of entry to the park.

IN ALL THE MOUNTAIN PARKS

MOUNTAIN CLIMBS

and

OVERNIGHT TRAIL CAMPS

For the safety of park visitors, National Parks Regulations require that any person who proposes climbing a mountain, or making a trail trip which requires camping out overnight, shall register full details of the journey with the Superintendent or District Park Warden before leaving, and also upon returning.

Motor Boats

... are only permitted in certain areas under free permit from the nearest Park Warden. All such craft must carry safety equipment required by the Federal Department of Transport.

Campfires


. . . are permitted only in fireplaces or stoves in campgrounds and picnic areas. For travel away from the roads, obtain travel and fire permits from the nearest Park Warden.

Bears can be dangerous

... For your protection it has been made illegal to feed or entice bears or other wild animals. Watch wildlife from a safe distance. Do not leave food open in your tent:

Interpretative Services

... are available in most of these Parks in summer. Enquire at Park Information Centres about nature trails, conducted nature trips, and evening film showings.

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INDIVIDUAL PARKS

JASPER

Park Information Centre

... in the townsite near the railway station.

Accommodation

. . . information and reservation service is provided by the Alberta Motor Association and the Alberta Tourist Association at their offices on Connaught Drive.

Motor Boats

... are permitted only on Pyramid and Medicine Lakes.

Mineral Hot Springs

... Miette Hot Springs with pool and steam-room facilities are 38 miles east of Jasper. (A heated freshwater swimming pool is located at the Recreation Centre in the townsite.)

Campgrounds

... with kitchen shelters, washrooms, and electricity are provided at Cottonwood Creek, ½ mile east of Jasper, and at Miette Hot Springs. Several smaller campgrounds are provided along the Banff-Jasper and Jasper-Edmonton Highways.

BANFF

Park Information Centres

... from May to October are at the Bow River Bridge in the townsite and near the Trans-Canada Highway (west) Junction at Lake Louise. During other months information can be obtained at the Administration Building and at the eastern Park entrance.

The Banff Chamber of Commerce also provides local information from their office at 317 Banff Avenue, throughout the year.

Accommodation

... reservations and local information are provided at the Alberta Motor Association and the Alberta Tourist Association offices behind the Park Information Centre in Banff townsite, in summer only. Year round reservations are offered by Travellers' Digest, 317 Banff Avenue (service charge).

Motor Boats

. . . are allowed only on Lake Minnewanka and on the Bow River at Banff.

INDIVIDUAL PARKS

Mineral Hot Springs

... The Upper Hot Springs, 2½ miles south of the townsite, also has steam-room and plunge facilities. The Cave and Basin pools are one mile west of the Bow River Bridge. (One of these is fresh water.)

Campgrounds

... with kitchen shelters, washrooms, laundry and electricity are provided at Tunnel Mountain, above the townsite, Two Jack Lake and at Johnson Canyon. Several smaller campgrounds are established along the highways. A new trailer area is also available at Tunnel Mountain.

WATERTON LAKES

Park Information Centre

... is at the entrance to Waterton Park townsite.

Campgrounds

... the serviced campground in the townsite has kitchen shelters, washrooms, laundry, and electricity. Campgrounds with lesser facilities are available at Cameron Lake, Red Rock Canyon and Belly River.

Motor Boats

... are permitted on Waterton Lakes and Maskinonge Lake.

KOOTENAY

Park Information Centre

... is immediately inside the western Park entrance.

Mineral Hot Springs

... Radium Hot Springs offers bathing in hot mineral waters—located in the townsite one mile east of the western Park entrance.

Campgrounds

... The serviced campground and trailer area with kitchen shelters, washrooms, and electricity is one mile southwest of Radium Hot Springs. Other campgrounds with kitchen shelters will be found at convenient locations along the Banff-Windermere Highway.

Park Information Centre

... inside west entrance of Park.

INDIVIDUAL PARKS

Campgrounds and Picnic Areas

... are located at Chancellor Peak, Kicking Horse Junction, Takakkaw Falls, Great Divide, Lake O'Hara and at Finn Creek. Kitchen shelters, washrooms and showers are provided at Kicking Horse Junction.

GLACIER

Park Information

. . . may be obtained from the District Wardens or from the Office of the Superintendent, Revelstoke, B.C.

Accommodation

... There is no private accommodation or stores in Glacier National Park. Visitors should bring their own camping outfits and adequate provisions.

Campgrounds

... The Illecillewaet Campground, one mile from the station, provides limited camping facilities. This area is being reconstructed and some inconvenience may result.

MOUNT REVELSTOKE

Park Information Centre

... is located in the Court House Building in the town of Revelstoke.


Campground

... is located at Balsam Lake. There are picnic areas at Mile 5 on the Park Highway and on the summit.

Accommodation

. . . Reservations and information are provided by the Revelstoke Board of Trade at 101 First Street East.

The Trans-Canada Highway is to be opened at an official ceremony in Glacier National Park in the late summer or early autumn of 1962. It is anticipated that, if earlier public travel is considered safe, its limited use between Revelstoke and Golden may be permitted before this ceremony. Such information is available at National Park Information Offices or official travel bureaus.
