

History on the **Edge**

For thousands of years different cultures travelled great distances to take advantage of the natural bounty of the West coast of Newfoundland and Southern Labrador. Each brought with them skills and new technologies that helped them thrive. Ancient Indigenous peoples arrived first. As sea levels and climate changed so too did the cultures that lived here. Vikings voyaged here from across the ocean a thousand years ago. Basque whalers came five centuries later to exploit the riches of the New World. Other Europeans came and settled on the land while Indigenous peoples maintained their presence. Ship wrecks, tall tales, mysterious stones, and sacred traditions; each culture left their mark on the landscape for us to discover.















Exploring a Living Landscape

Attracted by the rich resources of the sea, people have lived at Port au Choix for more than 6,000 years. A large sacred burial ground bears witness to the marine-based technology, economy and spiritual culture of the first people to live here – the Maritime Archaic. The remains of a large settlement at Phillip's Garden paint a vivid picture of the material and intellectual culture of the Groswater and Dorset people, 3,000 years later. After the arrival of Europeans, Indigenous people tentatively traded with fisherman at Benie Island. Discover the ancient peoples who journeyed through this special landscape and connect with today's thriving Indigenous cultures of Newfoundland and Labrador.

Things to do



Sacred Burial Grounds

Visit the Gathering Circle in the town of Port au Choix and reflect on the sacred burial grounds of the Maritime Archaic people. Thousands of years ago when sea levels were higher this area was an island. It was a special place to honour and lay to rest their loved ones.



Seal for All Seasons

Join an interpreter for the Seal for All Seasons program to explore the different ways past and present cultures have used seals to sustain their livelihoods.



Beauty and the Barrens

Go on a guided tour to explore the rare and fragile limestone barrens, home to shoreline fossils and rare arctic plants found nowhere else in Canada, and some species found nowhere else in the world.



Hiking in Port au Choix

Travel through time on hiking trails over dramatic limestone barrens, to coastal trails ideal for spotting whales, moose, caribou and sea birds. Visit archaeological sites including 5,500 year old Maritime Archaic sacred burial grounds and Phillip's Garden, one of the most important archaeological sites for Dorset and Groswater settlement in the world.

French Rooms Cultural Center



Learn about the resettlement era, the French migratory fishery and the Point Riche lighthouse. Local shrimp and crafts are available for purchase at the center gift shop.

Point Riche Lighthouse



Explore the areas around the Point Riche lighthouse. It is accessible by road and caribou are often seen grazing nearby. While there learn more about the history of the Dorset presence at Point Riche.

Learn about the adult salmon restocking story, view Atlantic salmon - eye to eye. Located in nearby Hawke's Bay it is the site of the province's most successful salmon enhancement program.

Good to know

Wild animals such as caribou are often seen on the trails in and around Port au Choix. Please do not approach or entice them, and be sure to give them space to safely pass you on the trail.

Did you know?

The Griscom's Arnica is in the sunflower family and grows at just nine sites around the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Of this small global population, more than 90% is found within Port au Choix National Historic Site!

An epic Viking adventure unearthed

Designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1978, L'Anse aux Meadows provides evidence of one of the great steps in human migration and is the only authentic Viking site in North America. Recalling epic voyages across raging oceans, L'Anse aux Meadows contains the remains of an 11th-century Viking basecamp and is the earliest known European presence on the American continent. At this Norse outpost on Newfoundland's windswept northernmost tip, walk in the footsteps of the Vikings and experience life in the North Atlantic.

Viking Encampment - Living History

Icebergs




Icebergs abound in the cold waters off Newfoundland and Labrador from early April to late June. Boat tours offer a chance to view Icebergs, whales, and bird life.

A Mystery of the deep unraveled

Mysterious red "pebbles" found scattered on Red Bay's rugged coastline were the first clue to a deep historic mystery. Revealed to be terracotta roofing tiles, a historic link to 16th-century Basque whalers was made. Designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2013, Red Bay Basque Whaling Station is an archaeological site that provides the earliest, most complete and best preserved testimony of the European whaling tradition. The site includes remains of rendering ovens, cooperages, wharves, temporary living quarters and a cemetery, together with underwater remains of vessels and whale bone deposits.

Digging through Time – Saddle Island Guided Tour

Take a short ride on the water shuttle with a Parks Canada guide to visit the archaeological sites on Saddle Island. Walk around the breath-taking island to hear first-hand experiences of finding some of Red Bay's most precious artifacts, check out where whale oil was processed, and explore the life and times of Labrador's 16th-century Basque whalers. Regularly scheduled tours depart from the Visitor Interpretation Centre.



If These Bones Could Talk

Explore the Boney Shore on a guided walk to see remains of a 16th-century whaling industry. Walk along the beautiful harbour with a view of Saddle Island. Let these ancient bones cast new light on the present-day population of North Atlantic right whales.



Bites of Basque History



Red Bay Right Whale Exhibit Selma Barkham Community Centre



The exhibit features the 400year old skeleton of a 52-foot Bowhead whale and focuses on the research and protection of the Bowhead and North Atlantic Right whales.

The UNESCO Experience in Newfoundland and Labrador





Four UNESCO World Heritage Sites

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization has designated sites from all over the world that are of outstanding natural and cultural significance. Newfoundland and Labrador is home to four of these World Heritage Sites. Visit:

- **Gros Morne National Park** a natural wonder created by continental collision 500 million years ago.
- L'Anse aux Meadows National Historic Site the only authenticated Viking settlement in North America.
- **Red Bay National Historic Site** the remnants of a 16th-century Basque whaling station.
- Mistaken Point Ecological Reserve fossils of the oldest complex life forms from 565 million years ago.
