Report on 14 July Trumpeter Swan Survey By: Brett Sarchuk

Resource Conservation Elk Island National Park Parks Canada

Today, we flew a Trumpeter Swan Survey for Elk Island, Cooking Lake-Blackfoot Grazing Reserve and south to Miquelon/Ministik Lakes.

Here are the results since 2009 including today's:

2009	33 adults and subadults	8 Breeding Pair 24 Cygnets hatched
2010	29 adults and subadults	7 Breeding Pair 25 Cygnets hatched
2011	30 adults and subadults	4 Breeding Pair 15 Cygnets hatched

The numbers seem to show that there aren't as many successful breeding pairs as in the past. I saw ten pairs together this year, with only four of them having cygnets. In 2009, there were 11 pairs (8 breeding), and 2010, 12 pairs (7 breeding). Maybe the rainy June had something to do with it and some nests were flooded. I did notice water was finally filling up marshes that have been dry for years. Also, this was my first time navigating, so there could be some missed pairs hanging around.

As Rob Kaye used to explain, the population is like a stock market, with short term ups and downs. However, the short supply of feed on the winter range in the USA remains a major limiting factor. Somewhere around 80 to 90 % of our cygnets are not surviving the winter months.

All the Breeding Pairs are in secluded spots with most being in Elk Island, Cooking-Lake Blackfoot and Ministik Bird Sanctuary. There were single swans hanging around, as well as a few groups of three. The best chance to see Trumpeters are these non-breeding subadults which tend to hang out in busier areas like Astotin Lake or wetlands along the Elk Island parkway. As well, Astotin Lake is used as a staging area in the Fall when Trumpeters and Tundras are getting ready to migrate south to their wintering grounds.
