Do you have what it takes to strike it rich in the Klondike?








BONANZA BINGO




FIND THE CACHE

DREDGE MECHANIC

A dredge is a big, floating machine that digs up dirt to shake and wash it all, revealing the hidden gold flakes. It dumps discarded dirt out behind it, forming those big tailing piles of rocks.

Can you figure out where each part of the machine belongs?

- **Bucket line**
- Sluice runs



GET MOVING A



DREDGE DANCE

Dredges work like your body: you eat food, keep the vitamins and discard the waste. The dredge piles in dirt, keeps the gold and gets rid of the rest.

Fill in the blanks with the correct dredge part and try out each action.

1. The at the bow of the dredge scoops dirt, just like you use your hands to eat food.

Make a scooping motion with your hands.

2. The mixes the rocks and dirt with water by rotating it around. similar to what happens in your mouth when chewing.



Spin around.

3. The sorts dirt from gold, the same as your stomach does with food waste and vitamins.



Shake your whole body.

4. The spits out waste gravel from the back of the dredge. Our bodies do that when we go to the bathroom! Pop a squat.



How low can you go?

5. The pull the dredge forward with cables to a new digging spot, but we use arms and legs to move.



Jump forward as far as you can.

6. The keeps the dredge anchored as it rotates side to side. We have feet that do that.



Stand on one foot and rotate

your torso from side to side.

Answers: 1. bucket line; 2. trommel; 3. sluice; 4. stacker; 5. winches; 6. spud




SALONG THE TRAIL

This area was already important to the Tr'ondëk Hwech'in First Nation for many years, not only for its beauty, but because it supported their way of life. Hunting and foraging provided food, warmth and medicine. When prospectors found gold here, the land changed with the introduction of more people, roads and machinery.

Put an X beside anything you think would not have existed before the discovery of gold.





Free Claim #6 is one of the few places you're allowed to freely pan for gold in the area. Are you ready to find your fortune?




Let's get panning!

1. Fill your pan three-quarters full of dirt.



3. Wash by tilting the pan slightly away from you and rock it gently, allowing the gravel to trickle out.





4. Shake and wash until you're left with a tablespoon of dirt.



5. Lift up and give the dirt a few swirls. Any gold will be left at the bottom of the pan. Store any flakes in a vial with some water. The gold you find is yours to keep!






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
