Experience the world's highest tides, pristine forests and the culture of Atlantic Canada!

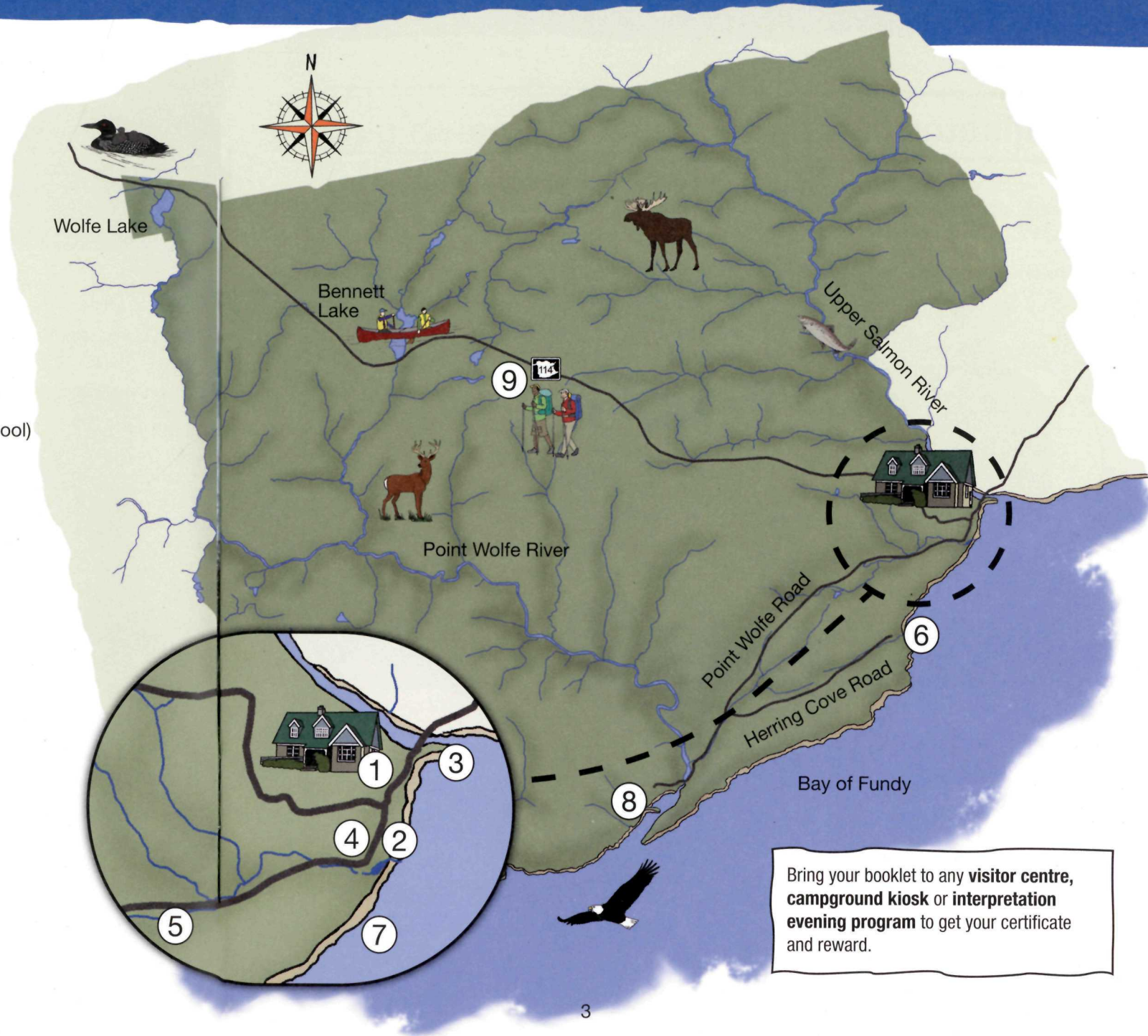
The lands we travel on within Fundy National Park is the traditional territory of the **Mi'gmaq** people. Always care and respect for the lands while exploring Fundy National Park.

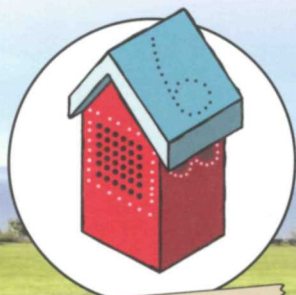

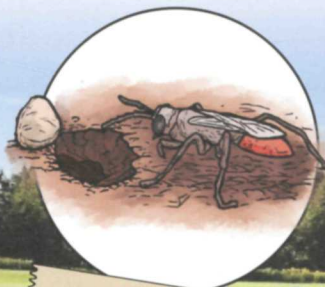
Pollinator garden

Looking for lichen

The forests of Fundy are the perfect place for lichen. They grow on trees, rocks, the ground, buildings and even under water! Lichens don't have roots and get their water and nutrients from the air.

If they're green, there's a lot of moisture in the air (humidity). When they are dry, grey or brown there is less water in the air.

Go find some Lung Lichen. Look at the colour. Brown or grey it's a dry day. Add a few drops of water from your bottle and watch the colour change!

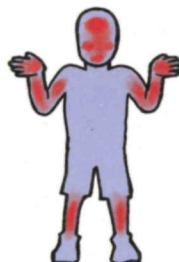

This picture was taken in 1950, at the opening of Fundy National Park. Compare this photograph to what you see today, circle 5 differences. We found 13!

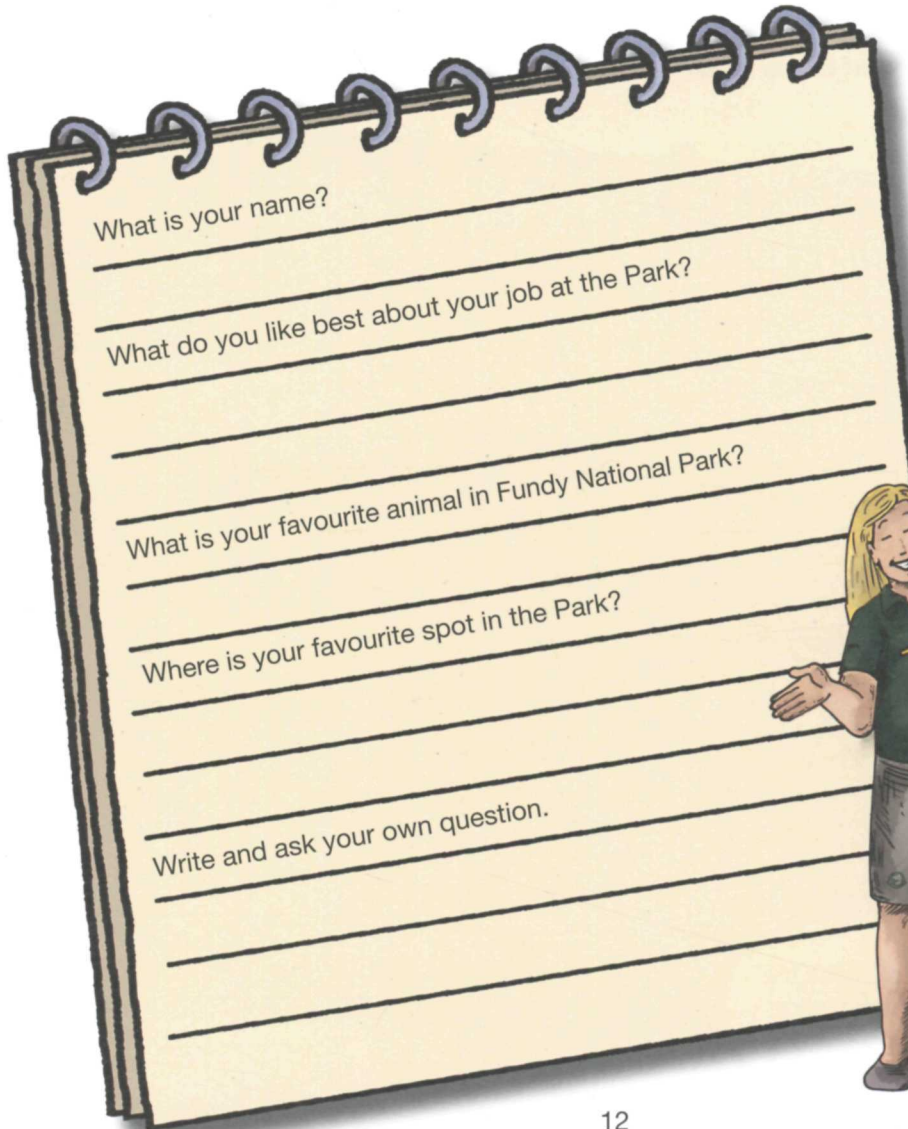

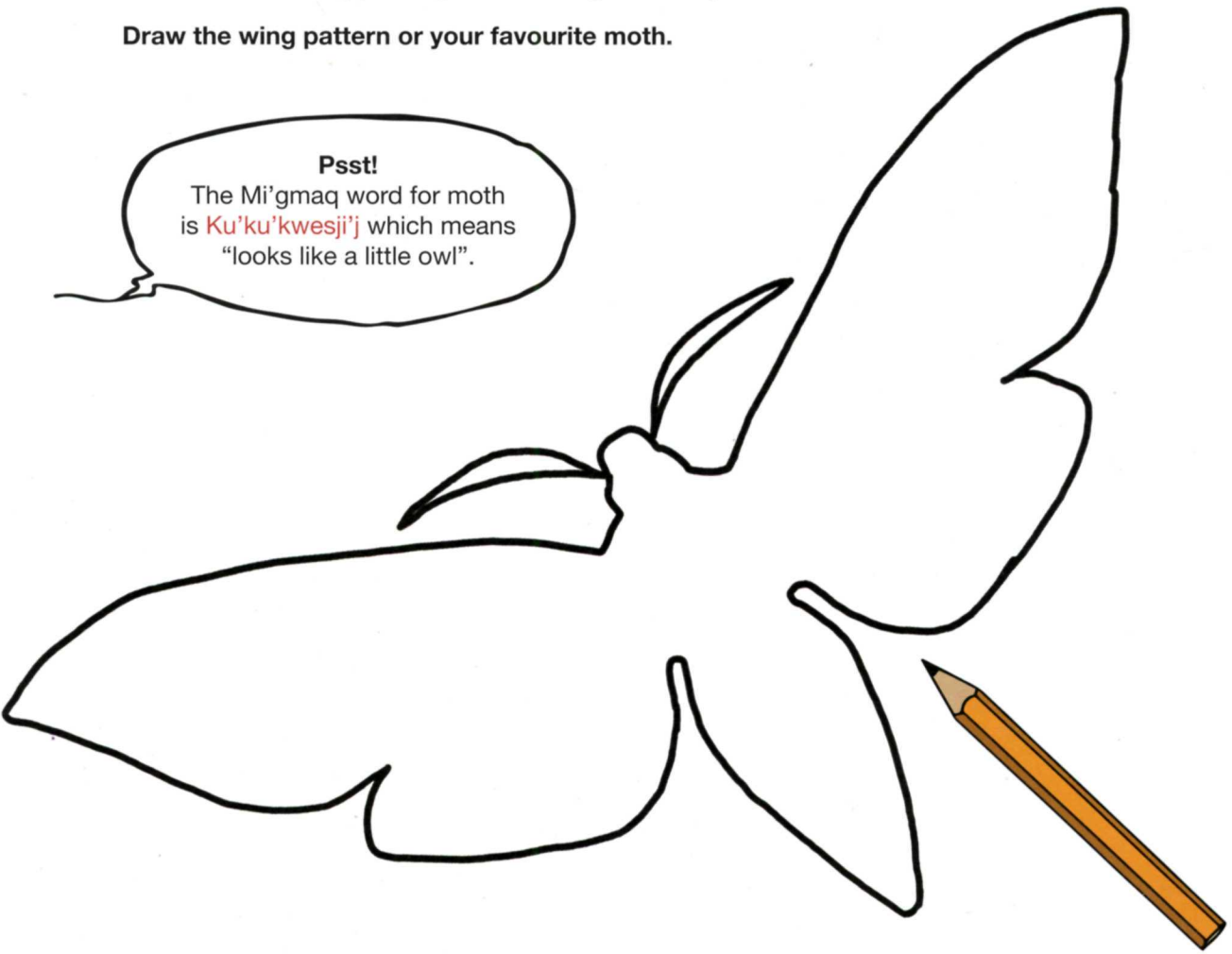
The night shift

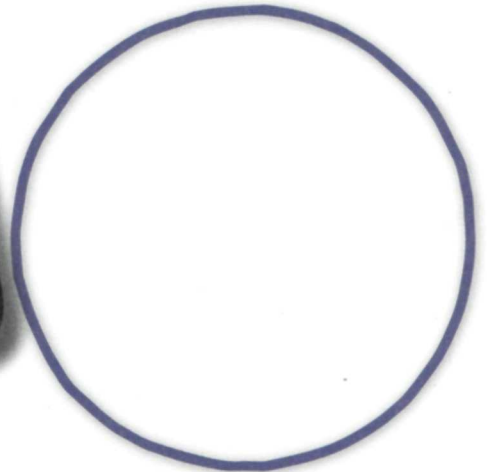
